CHILDREN BEARING BRUNT OF SAVAGE ECONOMIC CUTS

As you will be aware, Teaching and Non-Teaching staff in Schools have been engaged in a lengthy industrial dispute with the Department of Education regarding pay and conditions, which shows no signs of abating. This action includes action short of strike action and direct strike action. Teachers in Northern Ireland are currently the lowest paid teachers in the whole of the UK, and by quite some distance. Teachers in Northern Ireland continue to provide amongst the best educational experiences in these islands. Jacquie White, General Secretary of the Ulster Teachers' Unions has recently commented that "We are truly in unchartered territory now. Never before in the history of our profession have we faced such a parlous situation. Our education system here in Northern Ireland, once the envy of the UK and beyond, is in the jaws of a once in a lifetime crisis and unless something is done to address that it is our children who will pay the price".

One of the biggest challenges we face is the funding disparity between Northern Ireland and other regions in the UK. It is concerning to learn that Scotland receives £1,300 more per pupil than we do. This significant difference creates obstacles in providing the resources and opportunities that our students deserve and the biggest losers in a situation like this are invariably our children. The financial funding in regards to Education means that with every year, more and more schools face a deficit in their budgets, meaning that less and less money is available to schools to deliver the fullest provision possible - approximately 48% of schools in Northern Ireland are in a deficit situation and many of those that aren't, will be very soon. Society has changed, and is changing, at what seems to be breakneck speeds in the last number of years. Inevitably, those changes have found their way into schools and, as a result, the role of staff in schools has changed profoundly. This change has led to greater demands on Teaching and Non-Teaching staff, with far greater levels of need now in mainstream schools, when compared to the start of the new millennium. That being the case, it is not unreasonable to expect that an increasing level of need (and thus expectations on school staff) should be met with an appropriate level of increasing support. This is simply not happening and in addition the levels of practical and specialist support available to schools from external bodies, such as the Education Authority and the Department of Education, has steadily declined over the same time frame.

The Non-Teaching members of our staff team are every bit as invaluable as our Teaching Members and our school simply could not function without them, from office staff to classroom assistants, to caretaking and cleaning staff, to catering staff. However, it is also becoming increasingly difficult to recruit people into the likes of classroom assistant roles because they are overstretched and underpaid. At Harding Memorial Integrated Primary School, we remain committed to providing a high-quality education and positive learning environment for our students, despite the challenges we face. We are aware of possible future strike action by both Teaching and Non-Teaching Trade Unions. We know that they do not take this action lightly and struggle with these decisions. When a strike is called it is the duty of the Board of Governors to consider the health and safety of the school, complete the relevant risk assessment and share these findings with our school community as soon as possible. It is not easy for anyone. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation as we navigate through these difficult times together. In summary – I think I will leave the last words to Jacquie White, who has stated "How can any government justify the morality of allowing the most vulnerable in society – our children – to bear the brunt of savage economic cuts? Yet this is the reality of the failure to address the current – and deepening – crisis in our education.
